What you need to know about
Transportation
when visiting Iran...



- 1- **Buses** are the cheapest and most common form of transportation. Many city buses require transportation cards. The cards are sold at little huts next to bus stops.
- 2- **Subway/Metro** is a widespread system connecting most of the Tehran's neighborhoods. The first and last cabins of Tehran metro's trains are dedicated for women only, while the cabins in the middle are mixed gender.
- 3- **Taxis**, yellow and green cars are typically official private taxis. However, many locals use the app Snapp (<https://snapp.ir>) to arrange rides with any driver who's part of the service.
- 4- **Any car** can be a taxi. Enterprising locals will often act as unofficial taxi drivers.
- 5- **Motorcycle taxis** loiter on major corners all over town and make an adrenalin-inducing way to get across town in a hurry. They cost as much as taxis but take half the time. Don't expect a spare helmet to wear!



- 6- **Train** is a good idea of transportation between some cities.
- 7- **Airline**, there are also domestic airlines, for those that want to save time and don't mind paying a bit extra.

Tip 1: If you take the inter-city bus, do book a VIP one, the difference in price is small and you will get very comfortable seats and even a meal.

Tip 2: There are some apps for the smartphone to help you get by in the metro. One is Tehran Metro and informs you also about landmarks, services, restaurants and buses around each metro station, and Tehran Metro Map for a complete map of all the lines.

Tip 3: Traffic in Tehran is pretty mental, and Iranians' driving style can be quite adventurous, so rent a car only if you feel confident and brave enough. Depending on the provinces, highways and country roads are pretty quiet, even though you will find many trucks, so you should inquire the best times to get on the road between cities and provinces.
